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OVERVIEW

Overview:

The African continent is a 1.2-billion-person market and will reach 2 billion by 2050. It has the youngest population in the world with more than 400 million young people between the ages of 15 and 35 years. Africa is undeniably a vast land of opportunities with 60% of arable land, abundant water resources, rich ecosystems, 365 days of solar, young vibrant population and cheap labour. However, the continent still faces various challenges (i.e. climate change, low investments in agri-food systems, infrastructure gaps, unskilled youth, land reforms, and fragmented agri-food policy) to create job opportunities for youth and women and ensure food and nutrition security. Hosted under the leadership of H.E. Bassirou Diomaye Diakhar FAYE, President of the Republic of Senegal, the Africa Food Systems Forum 2025 Summit will bring together public and private sector leaders, policymakers, researchers, development partners, and youth champions around the theme: **“Africa’s Youth Leading Collaboration, Innovation, and Implementation of Agri-Food Systems Transformation.”**

This year, the African Union launched the Kampala Comprehensive African Agricultural Development Programme (CAADP) with the aim to mobilize \$100 billion. The Summit will be a prime moment to meet the escalating challenge of food security in Africa and center African youth by honestly taking stock of our progress and integrating them into our political and financial commitments and innovations towards productive, nutritious, inclusive, resilient, and sustainable food systems.

At the end of the High-Level Summit, it is expected that commitments will be made by Heads of States to:

- **Presidential summit and declaration**
- **Communiqué on food systems from the ministerial**
- Country **Food Systems CAADP implementation with** Ministerial declaration
- MSMs and country Deals closed
- Sharing of best good practices/solutions and technologies to scale up

Young Leaders

To foster peer-to-peer learning and enduring friendships among the younger generation, the AFS Forum will convene events in the Youth Dome, feature youth speakers in all high-level discussions, hold the Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurship Competition, and launch platforms to intensify youth exchanges during and beyond the summit.



MAIN ACTIVITIES

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Teranga – Host Showcase and Facts of the Day

Rooted in Senegalese hospitality, the Teranga moment offers daily showcases of (i) national innovation, culture, and food systems leadership (ii) highlights of main food systems topic by practitioners. Morning briefings, technical and cultural moments highlight Senegal's and Africa's contributions to the Forum's goals, helping participants start each day with local context and inspiration and link with Africa's and global perspectives.

Plenary Sessions

Plenary sessions are the cornerstone of AFS Forum, bringing together high level distinguished African and global leaders, policymakers, researchers, and youth leaders to unpack critical challenges and opportunities shaping the continent's food systems. From state-of-the-sector vision, policy direction, governance, Investment and finance, nutrition, trade, and youth leadership, reports and strategic dialogues these sessions set the tone for each day, providing a platform for bold ideas, actions announcements, and collective reflection on the Forum's core theme.

Thematic Sessions

Organized around key priority themes, the thematic sessions serve as platforms for knowledge sharing, dialogue, and collaboration on key aspects of Africa's food systems transformation. These sessions create opportunities for actionable learning and idea exchange that feed into high-level deliberations and follow-up on themes such as women and youth in food systems, sustainability and climate, finance and accountability, digital innovation, trade and regional integration. The thematic sessions are integral to fostering continuous stakeholder engagement and driving progress aligned with the Forum's overarching goal of transforming Africa's food systems with a strong focus on youth leadership and collaboration.

Stakeholder Forums & High-Level Ministerial Roundtables and Deep Dives

Stakeholder forums—including the Researchers Forum, Private Sector Forum, Parliamentarians' Forum, Civil Society Forum, and Farmers—and three ministerial roundtables—the High-Level Ministerial Roundtable (CAADP), Ministerial Deep Dive on Livestock, and Ministerial Deep Dive on Energy—will allow like-minded groups to deliberate in focused formats. These invite collaboration, policy alignment, and network-building, and are critical for ensuring that all voices, from ministers to scientists, help shape Africa's food future.

Youth Dome

The Youth Dome is designed to serve as a powerful launchpad for youth-led solutions that drive sustainable and inclusive food systems across Africa. This dynamic, interactive space will empower young voices, foster innovation, and provide crucial pathways for youth employment and the growth of agribusiness. This youth platform will showcase youth-led agribusinesses, startups, and digital solutions, connecting them to resources through youth-

focused dialogues, GoGetta Live Pitches, capacity-building mentorships, an innovation showcase, and targeted networking opportunities.

Investment Room

The Investment Room hosts, throughout the week, a high-impact matchmaking platform linking governments, SMEs, and investors to drive agricultural financing and partnerships. It also includes, Legacy Programs serve as flagship platforms for investment pledges, showcasing scalable national strategies and priority projects.

Knowledge Hub

The Knowledge Hub is a curated learning space offering reports, data dashboards, technical briefs, and research findings from across the continent. Delegates can access the latest intelligence supporting food systems transformation and engage with experts translating data into action. The Knowledge Hub will also host Masterclasses covering various topics that will offer hands-on support for young people, entrepreneurs, startups and governments.

Side Events

AFS Forum offers space for in-depth engagement on emerging topics and partners joint work, new partnerships, and sector-specific innovations. Hosted by thematic platforms as well as partners across government, business, academia, and civil society, these sessions enable targeted exchanges that contribute to the broader agenda while offering practical insights, launches, and collaborative opportunities.

Senegal Pavilion

The Senegal Pavilion at the AFS Forum 2025 will showcase the innovations, initiatives, and partnerships that are shaping the future of agri-food systems in Senegal and Africa. A true space for dialogue and visibility, it will serve as a platform to showcase national successes, the experiences of young leaders, and local solutions to food and climate challenges. Through interactive sessions, exhibitions, and high-level exchanges, the Pavilion will illustrate Senegal's commitment to the sustainable, inclusive, and resilient transformation of African agriculture.

Agri-Food Expo

The Agri-Food Expo is the Forum's vibrant exhibition zone, featuring different pavilions, private sector showcases, innovation pods, and startup booths. It is a space for networking, discovery, and collaboration—where ideas come to life through technology demonstrations, product and solutions launches, and interactive displays. The Expo also hosts the culinary village as well as the stage for the Arbre à Palabres.

L'Arbre à Palabres (Breakthroughs Tree)

This conversational stage brings together thought leaders, chefs, youth, and innovators in a relaxed setting to explore food systems "breakthroughs." Through storytelling and dialogue, participants examine the cultural, scientific, and policy dimensions of Africa's food future in a unique, inclusive atmosphere.

Culinary Village

At the Culinary Village, tradition meets innovation. Attendees enjoy live cooking demonstrations, tastings, and chef-led showcases of African ingredients and culinary heritage. It's a celebration of food culture that highlights the nutritional, economic, and environmental importance of local diets and cuisines and links with sustainable production and consumption.

Entrepreneurship Training and Masterclasses

Designed to build practical skills and business acumen, master classes and training sessions offer hands-on support for young people, entrepreneurs and startups on food systems. Covering various topics, these sessions equip youth with the tools to succeed and grow within Africa's dynamic food sector.

Special Events

The AFSF Forum provides participants with the opportunity to experience a diverse array of special events organized by select partners. These events create spaces to explore issues in innovative and engaging formats, encouraging dialogue and collaboration beyond the formal sessions of the Forum. By weaving additional perspectives and approaches into the program, the special events enrich the overall Forum experience and allow for deeper reflection, broader engagement, and more time dedicated to achieving tangible outcomes.

Podcast Pod

The Podcast Pod records and broadcasts live interviews with speakers, youth leaders, and innovators, capturing the energy and insight of AFS Forum in real-time. Episodes will be distributed online to extend the Forum's reach and spark ongoing dialogue beyond Dakar.

TEDx

TEDx at AFS Forum brings the spirit of "ideas worth spreading" to food systems transformation. Featuring powerful talks from African youth, women leaders, and changemakers, this platform inspires bold action through personal stories, breakthrough innovations, and transformative visions for the continent.

AFSF Awards: Africa Food Prize, Gogettaz, WAYA

Key special moments of the week celebrate African Excellence. The Awards ceremonies comprise the Africa Food Prize, the GoGettaz and WAYA all taking place at different moments of the week. A prominent Award recognizing an outstanding individual or institution that is leading the effort to change the reality of farming in Africa with 100,000 USD Prize. The Gogettaz recognizes youth entrepreneurs or entrepreneurial solutions, innovations sharing their experiences and driving conversations on the future of food systems from the frontlines. WAYA, an AGRA prestigious award scheme that recognizes female agripreneurs demonstrating remarkable Innovation and business excellence in agricultural value chains

- 5-hectare irrigated perimeter for youth agripreneurs (31 women among 40 trained).
- Infrastructure: solar-powered pumping, storage facilities, training in market-oriented agriculture (SHEP).
- Focus: Youth employment, women's economic empowerment, partnership model (local gov + IFAD).

Part 3: DIA-AGRO (Mbao Forest)

- Market gardening site run by a young woman agripreneur (CNCR youth college).
- Crops: lettuce, cabbage, tomato, pepper, onion.
- Focus: Continuous supply of fresh produce, youth-led agribusiness.

Field Visit 4 – Diamniadio Zone: Industrial & Agro-Processing Hubs

Part 1: Cargo-Village of ZESID (Dias)

- Integrated logistics hub linked to Dakar's international airport.
- Facilities: bonded warehouses, offices, under-customs corridor to air terminal.
- Focus: Strengthening Senegal as a logistics hub, boosting exports, reducing congestion in Dakar.

Part 2: Integrated Industrial Platform of Diamniadio (P2ID)

- 53 ha economic zone hosting industries and services.
- Visits to 3 agro-industrial companies:
- Djolof Eloc: juices from local fruits, cereals, spices.
- Galion: plastic packaging for food industry.
- Baobaoshu: eco-friendly cardboard packaging.
- Focus: Industrial development, agro-processing, packaging innovation.

Part 3: Le Lionceau

- Senegalese company producing baby food from local crops (millet, fonio, baobab, moringa).
- Promotes local nutrition solutions, supports sustainable agriculture.
- Focus: Child nutrition in first 1,000 days, empowering local producers, job creation.

After nearly two decades of CAADP implementation, Biennial Review reports indicate that Africa is not on track to meet the Malabo Declaration targets by 2025. As the continent transitions from the Malabo phase, focus shifts to the Kampala CAADP Strategy and Action Plan (2026–2035), which prioritizes agrifood systems transformation as central to Africa’s economic agenda. Given the complexity of agrifood systems, an inclusive and coordinated approach is essential to ensure all stakeholders understand the Kampala framework, their roles, and the need for adequate resource allocation.

The Declaration further called upon Parliamentarians to:

- Integrate the commitments into national policies, strategies, and budget frameworks, and operationalize them through **National Agrifood Systems Investment Plans (NASIPs)** with the necessary tools and implementation programs.
- Support Member States and Regional Economic Communities (RECs) in the design and implementation of agrifood system policies and investment plans through appropriate legislation, financing, and oversight; and
- Ensure that at least **10% of annual public expenditure** is allocated to agrifood systems, with mechanisms to monitor its effective use.

In response, the Africa Food Systems Parliamentary Network (AFSPaN), in partnership with the Parliament of Senegal, will convene a Parliamentarians Forum. This platform will facilitate structured dialogue to develop a Parliamentary Roadmap with actionable commitments, to be reviewed each year. A key focus will be inclusive dialogue aligned with Kampala’s Commitment 4, bill approvals that are food systems sensitive by committees, promoting youth-informed policy recommendations and meaningful youth participation in advancing decent work across the agrifood value chain.

Decentralized Renewable Energy (DRE), such as off-grid solar, can meet up to 80% of off-grid agricultural needs but is often overlooked in favor of large-scale grid projects. DRE can power irrigation, refrigeration, and processing, supporting nutrition and smallholder livelihoods. Integrated energy planning that aligns centralized and decentralized solutions with agricultural needs is essential. More than half the population on the African continent suffers from inadequate micronutrient intake. The climate crisis, overreliance on a narrow set of staples, and soil degradation exacerbate the problem, leading to crop failures, yield declines, and reduced nutrient density in crops. In addition, over the past two decades, urban population growth and rising incomes in West Africa have increased demand for diverse, convenient, safe and nutritious foods, including processed products. At the same time, urbanization is changing foods environments—the physical, economic, and informational contexts that influence consumer food choices—with expected implications for nutrition.

Drawing on findings from the OECD/SWAC report “**Diet Transformations and Changing Food Environments in the Sahel and West Africa**”, this session will examine shifting consumption patterns, the expanding diversity and complexity of food outlets, and their implications for nutrition, affordability, and policy. It will highlight how these trends vary across countries and income groups and underscore the need for stronger data systems to better understand and guide future food system changes.

The session will also draw on findings from the study report “**A Growing Opportunity for Nutrition**” by Welthungerhilfe (WHH) and nutritionists Kendra Byrd and Caroline Joyce, this session will demonstrate how scaling up the production and consumption of 20 nutrient-dense and climate-smart opportunity crops can help to close micronutrient intake gaps in countries with a high burden of hunger and undernutrition. The session will examine priority micronutrient gaps in countries with high hunger levels, how scaling opportunity crops can affect micronutrient availability and food system resilience, and what leverage points exist for scaling opportunity crops for improved nutrition.

To address persistent trade barriers and unlock the potential of Africa's agricultural sector, as mandated by the Council of Ministers, the AfCFTA Secretariat, in collaboration with the Government of Rwanda and with support from the Alliance for a Green Revolution in Africa (AGRA), has developed a continental Agri-Trade Action Plan. This Plan provides a practical and actionable framework for advancing the agricultural trade dimensions of the AfCFTA, with a focus on accelerating intra-African trade in agri-food products, enhancing regional value chains, and promoting agro-industrial development. It operationalizes the AfCFTA Private Sector Strategy by identifying priority value chains with high potential to improve food security, promote import substitution, and deepen regional market integration.

The plan seeks to (i) strengthen the enabling environment for intra-Africa trade and progressively eliminating tariffs and non-tariff barriers (NTBs) to trade including addressing sanitary and phytosanitary (SPS) constraints, (ii) accelerating the development of regional value chains, and (iii) spurring the industrialization of food production and distribution. The Plan is designed to support the AfCFTA's goal of enhancing intra-African trade and strengthening Africa's global trading position. Its vision is of a thriving, interconnected agri-food market that fosters sustainable growth, food security, and improved farmer livelihoods across Africa. The plan prioritized seven value chains: maize, rice, soya, fruits and vegetables, palm oil, meat, and fish, on the basis of their (i) economic potential, i.e., job creation potential and contribution to the economy; (ii) trade potential, i.e., import substitution, demand, value addition; (iii) and impact potential, i.e., food security, nutritional value, climate resilience, inclusivity (women, youth, SHFs), as well as (iv) other aspects, such as strategic importance (alignment with government / regional priorities) and geographic diversity.

Developed through an evidence-based and consultative process with Regional Economic Communities and private sector actors, the Plan also aims to align with existing African Union frameworks to ensure that agricultural trade contributes meaningfully to sustainable development and inclusive economic transformation across the continent.

This event will seek to popularize the plan as well as mobilize funding and investments towards the implementation of the plan.

The collapse of biodiversity makes access to these forms of sovereignty even more difficult, because it mainly affects local species that are deeply rooted in dietary, social, and cultural habits and traditions. Horticultural species, fruits, vegetables, spices, aromatic and medicinal plants are among the most useful and most affected. Beyond genetic heritage, it is intangible heritage, knowledge, and know-how that are disappearing: the knowledge, experience, cultivation, association, conservation, and preparation practices that promote soil and climate adaptation and socio-economic roles. The round table provides an opportunity for various stakeholders in research, development, and higher education to illustrate the benefits for younger generations of good material and intangible management of these traditional species.</p>

Fragile contexts across Africa remain largely underserved by multi-year food system financing, despite their centrality to regional food production, and market potential. Also, most biodiversity hotspots and carbon stocks are found in fragile contexts. Even though the number of fragile contexts has been steadily increasing in the past 20 years, they remain at the margins of agricultural policy discourse and private sector investment and are largely reliant on cycles of humanitarian relief. Women and youth often bear the brunt of stifled economic opportunity and recurring food insecurity, despite their critical role in driving more resilient and sustainable food systems as well as supply and demand of food. This event will spotlight policy, development and private sector-led solutions to resilient and sustainable food systems in fragile contexts, while highlighting their central role and potential in advancing co-benefits of inclusive economic growth, food and nutrition security, and climate resilience.
